The Twin Cities Market is organised by the City's Department for International Relations and is intended for international traders and city friendship associations who, with great commitment from volunteers offer their goods and are more than happy to inform interested people about their twinning activities. The associations use any profit made at the market to implement social, cultural and humanitarian projects.
